Basingstoke and Deane

Providing affordable homes that meets residents' needs and ensuring the bidding process is simple

is a key priority for Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council's new Cabinet.

To support residents in making an application to get onto the Borough's housing register, an additional £130,000 of funding was allocated for two new housing officers at a Cabinet meeting on Tuesday 5 September, from funding held to support the delivery of the Council Plan priorities. The new officers will work closely with residents to understand their needs when making an application and also provide additional support to those who need it when they are bidding for new homes through the council's social rented lettings system, Homebid.

In September, there were 4,900 people currently on the housing register waiting to be matched to a home.

Cabinet Member for Residents' Services and Housing Cllr Laura James said: "The growing number of people on the housing register, the waiting time for properties to become available and the growing gap between the cost of renting privately and what residents can afford is making finding a home even more challenging.

"Our priority is doing everything we can to make it easier for people to get onto the housing register and to ensure their application reflects the needs they have. Our additional investment will ensure our housing team can work more closely with residents when joining the housing register and support them when bidding for a home."

Has your parcel gone missing?


If your parcel wasn't delivered to the location you agreed, it's the seller's legal responsibility to sort out

the issue. Check the delivery address you gave the seller. Then contact them and ask where your order is. If the seller claims they've delivered it or doesn't know where it is, you can ask for a redelivery. You might be able to get a refund in some circumstances.

If your item left with a neighbour or somewhere else has gone missing, it depends on whether your item was delivered by Royal Mail or a courier. If

Royal Mail left something with a neighbour or in a certain place because you told them to, it's not the seller or Royal Mail's responsibility if it gets lost.

If Royal Mail left something with a neighbour or in a certain place and you didn't tell them to, it's the seller's responsibility if it gets lost. You should contact the seller to ask for a redelivery or a refund - you can phone, email



If your item was delivered by a courier, check your terms and conditions or account details - they might include other places for delivery, like your porch or a neighbour's house. If you agreed to them, it's not the seller's responsibility if your order has gone missing. If your item wasn't delivered to the location you agreed, it's the seller's legal responsibility to sort out the issue. You can ask them to redeliver your item. You can ask for a full refund if a delivery date was essential and wasn't met, a delivery date was agreed but wasn't essential, and a second date also wasn't met or no delivery date was agreed and a second chance to deliver was not successful. A delivery date is essential if you told the seller you needed your delivery by a specific date. For either a refund or a redelivery, you can phone, email or write a letter. 

The Church Pages

Asked about Remembrance Sunday on a radio programme, one person said, 'It's boring'. That seems to be the easiest way of making a criticism without really thinking, and it can be applied to everything. Do you like Maths? No, it's boring. Literacy? Boring. Will you now load the dishwasher, tidy your room? Do I have to? It's boring.



The reason why so many things are dismissed in this kind of way must be because the whole world seems to be designed to stop us getting bored. Watching the telly, you are bored, so zap and there is another programme in a split second. If you don't like one game on your electronic device, try another. In comparison with all that digital entertainment offers, real life may seem pretty boring.

In our contemporary world someone is bound to be wondering where the fast forward button is so that we can get past the talk of cancelled infra-structure projects, the continuing and rising levels of poverty, the inflammatory language of prejudice and find something more interesting. But someone else will say, 'This is the real world with things happening in real time, not a make-believe one on a screen'. And that is really important, because we all know that the most important part of the Remembrance Sunday service consists of two minutes of complete boredom. For two minutes we stand still and nothing happens.

On Remembrance Sunday we will stand with people who have experienced war. They know that some things are so important that you do them no matter how tedious they seem. These people are probably wearing medals, the medals that recognise their devotion to duty in war. And those who know about these things say that, for most people, war is 95% boredom and 5% the most terrifying thing you will ever experience in your whole life.

So there will be two minutes' silence, no distractions, and real concentration. We're here to remember. And that is going to be hard because, when we remember those who died in war, we are faced with the most terrible evil. The deaths of service personnel and the deaths of civilians are part of the terrible cost of war. And we haven't learned to avoid it yet. War still goes on. If it is difficult to concentrate in the silence you may like to have a thought to help you remember and to live in hope of a better world.

"If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all".

Nature Notes

Brushing our teeth in the bathroom one morning, my toddler and I hear a ragged chorus of honking sweep over our roof. 'See, see!' my little one urges, pointing at the black morning outside the window, but I explain that the birds have long gone. One evocative sound of the turning season — migratory geese coming from the north to winter in the more temperate UK. I can use memories to imagine the skein as it soars in an amazing V-formation; she will have to wait until she has more experience of this lovely sight.

We still have late blackbird fledglings hopping after their parents along the garden fences, disheveled, and gorged with the fat of their parents' diligent feeding and lack of exercise. The robin is a regular visitor now, stalking my husband as he plants new shrubs whilst the ground is still soft and moist.

Sudden gusts shake the tired trees who are, I wonder, like me, welcoming the chillier mornings. I watch the leaves of the white poplar flutter like tiny flashing lights in the dull grey sky. The wind whisks the fallen leaves into whirlwinds, giving their crisp, lifeless forms a new energy as they dance in circles, dragging their hardened edges across the concrete. My daughter points at them and says, 'Running away!' as she watches them delightedly.

It feels like a quiet, anticipatory time of year – all natural things pausing to take a breath before the sharp winter takes it from us by force. As we amble along in and out of the long afternoon shadows, I point out tiny spiders sitting motionless like bullseyes in their webs, spread across neatly trimmed conifer hedges. A petal falls from a lonely peach-coloured rose, clinging on to these last balmy days – but the flowers on the bush are now well outnumbered by swollen red rose hips, fat with seed. A crow's caw breaks the silence, echoing over the house roofs. We catch sight of a little muntjac deer dashing across the road and scurrying up the track past The Crown. Currently, the favourite stopping point on our walks is to see the *iris foetidissima* – or the rather unflatteringly termed, 'stinking iris' – whose eruption of orange berries from its split pods are an enduring fascination.

November in the Garden

With the very short days upon us, it is a race to get the last of the jobs done in the garden before daylight and weather defeats us.

The compost heap or bin will be in a great deal of use at this time of year. Do make sure there is a good mix with fallen leaves, grass cuttings, garden and vegetable kitchen waste. Keep the heap or bin moist and covered, the compost will be ready to use in 12 to 18 months.

Most plants in the borders and beds can be cut down now as they will have finished flowering. The tender plants will need to be lifted and protected from the frost. I choose to leave my dahlia plants in the garden. I cut them back to the ground level, then place quite a large pile of soil on top to prevent the frost from penetrating. This worked earlier in the year when we had the very heavy frost as they all survived and flowered beautifully this summer.

Tulips need to be planted now as it is getting late to do the job. Do you remember to give the bulbs good drainage to prevent the bulbs from rotting. When I plant tulips in tubs I prefer to plant them in two layers.

Net any brassicas that you have in the garden as the birds will feast on them during the winter months. Dig over any vacant garden as this will give the frost a chance to break up the soil. Applying a thick layer of mulch at this time of the year will give protection from the winter months to some of the plants in the garden.

Bare rooted roses, trees and shrubs can still be planted now if the soil is not frozen. Keep raking up the fallen leaves to prevent spoiling plants and the lawns and of course harbouring slugs and snails. It's also a good idea to tie in climbers as the winter winds can cause damage.

Seed catalogues are available now and will pass the time on a wet day. Please keep in mind the advice for storing seeds that I gave last month.

Cleaning the shed for storing our cleaned and oiled tools plus washed flowerpots is a rewarding job to do and don't forget to dispose of the out of date garden products.

If the weather permits, it's still possible to lay any new lawn turfs if necessary. There should be berries in the garden to admire and hopefully some beautifully coloured leaves before they fall. Winter pansies thrive at the moment as do the sedums and rose hips.




