ARE YOU REGISTERED TO VOTE? - Households in the Borough will be contacted throughout August and September by Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council's Electoral Registration Officer as part of the annual electoral registration canvass.

Each year the council is required by law to contact households to confirm the names of residents are correct on the electoral register or to update them.

Residents who have consented to receiving information about electoral registration by email will receive an email from electoral.services@basingstoke.gov.uk with the subject line 'Do Not Delete - You need to respond. Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council are updating the electoral register.'

The council has been working closely with the Electoral Commission and the Cabinet Office on this new approach which is compliant with data protection rules and reduces the amount of paper sent out. Residents who would prefer not to be emailed can easily unsubscribe from the service and will be sent a paper form instead. People who do not receive an email will receive a paper form at a later date.

The Borough Council's Electoral Registration Officer Rebecca Emmett said: "The Council is required by law to obtain and confirm the names of residents to check who is eligible to register to vote and ensure our Electoral Register is up-to-date. To make sure you are able to have your say at the May 2022 elections you should respond to the email or complete and return the paper form as quickly as possible."

The revised register of electors will be published in December 2021. For more information call 01256 844844.

Please make sure you have your property number on your bin as this helps crews return it to the correct place after it has been emptied. Number stickers can be ordered from the Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council Website.



We commence our new meeting programme on THURSDAY 30th SEPTEMBER 2021





This time Richard will tell us of Kingsclere in World War 2.

Kingsclere was a base for thousands of troops especially in training prior to D—Day. The village had its own Royal Observer Corps., Home Guard and Women's Land Army units. There was an important gunnery testing range by the Downs and a military shooting at the Crown which was hushed up at the time but later received national coverage. All these areas and others will be included in Richard's presentation.

Immediately before the presentation we will hold our ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING at 7.00pm.

We meet in the main hall at the Village Club, 37 George Street. Visitors are always very welcome to all of our meetings at £3 pp.

Kingsclere Churchyard

Gareth Martin wrote an article earlier in the year about the church headstones once removed and now lost.

The number of headstones were 365 with 240 now missing. Considering there has been a graveyard on this site for over a thousand years that doesn't seem a large number. So how many people do you think are buried here? It may be greater than you imagine!



Thomas Cromwell, after the Reformation, charged that parishes should keep a Register of Christenings, Burials and Marriages. Those records for

Kingsclere dating from 1538 are now in the Hampshire Records Office in Winchester. Records between 1680 and 1880 have been entered into a database to which I have added, using work done by the Hampshire Genealogical Society, the data from 1540 to 1680. This tells us that between 1540 and 1880 there were 11,890 people buried in Kingsclere!

The late 16th century shows roughly 30 burials a year excepting those when the village succumbed to plague and other diseases. A glaring absence in the records are the deaths due to the Great Plague. There is a gap between

November 1665 and May 1666 with nothing recorded. We know from the parish records that those suffering from the plague were removed at that time to dwellings constructed in the area known as the "Marsh" lying between the Union Lane and what is now the West Kingsclere garage. Those that died were buried in that area.

How many people are buried in this churchyard from before 1538? We know that Kingsclere existed in Anglo-Saxon times, that the church was given by King Edward the Confessor to his wife Edith and was one of the largest and most valuable in the Diocese of Winchester having a market granted from the 12th century. It is possible that a church stood here for over 600 years before our records begin and that there was a substantial community here. A discussion of how large that population was is too complex for these pages. It would not be unreasonable to suggest that our figure for the number of burials of nearly 12,000 could be doubled if we include that extra 600 years. Can all those people really be buried in such a small area? We do know some were buried in an area called the Litten where the Health Centre carpark now stands though this has been thought to be used mainly for those who died during the Black Death. There is also mention in the parish records of bones being stored in the church beneath a gallery that once stood in the chancel. Also mentioned are graves needing to be dug at right angles to the normal East/ West direction due to the ground falling into collapsed graves.

Our beautiful churchyard where the children play has many a story to tell.

Nature Notes

If there could be an upside to so many restrictions in the last sixteen months it would be in the proliferation of wildflowers, both natural and cultivated.

On a visit to The National Trust's Vyne a wonderful tapestry of colour met our gaze in the walled garden where a plot had been sown with a wildflower mix of annuals. There were more varieties than we could name but old, one-time cornfield flowers like corncockle and corn marigold were included.



Three sponsored roundabouts on the A339 between Newbury and Kingsclere have been sown with wildflowers too. Poppies and cornflowers on one, eye-catching wreaths of colour on the others, in particular the display on the Knightsbridge roundabout.

Self-sown hardy knapweed, scabious and vetches colour the verges of the Ecchinswell Road with willowherb to follow. It is a good example of selective cutting where only parts of verges affecting lines of sight need to be cut.



All creatures like a free feast and rooks are no exception. We were hit by high winds and downpours recently and a field of barley had swathes of its crop laid low. In no time a line of rooks appeared and took advantage of ears at easy reach at ground level. We have seen birds dancing on individual

ears and forcing them to the ground but this required no effort.

Once again tufted ducks have shown to be late breeders with a duck and her family of five tiny ducklings. They were no more than balls of feathers but surprisingly, set an example by Mum, they were capable of diving.

A female blackbird was seen with a beakful of food very recently, a reminder that there are still late broods in some hedges.

Reading Chronicle April 1771

Kingsclere Turnpike

'Whereas many persons to avoid the payment of the toll at the gate at the foot of Whitehill make a practise of riding on each side of the said gate especially that track now made use of up Longmeadow and across the field to a place entering on the downs called Drove Way the trustees of the said Road give this public notice that they will levy the penalty of *40 shillings on every person so offending there being no allowed road up the hill except that Turnpike Rd.'

*40 shillings equivalent to £173 today. Labourers earned approx. £21 pa.



This month JLD School of Dance is 30 years old!

In 1991 dynamic Elmhurst Ballet School DANCE graduates Jo Eustace and Lucy Bamford (who was just 3 months into motherhood) started JLD by teaching twice weekly ballet classes at Richard Aldworth

School in Basingstoke with only three students. 18 months later the opportunity arose to move JLD to Kingsclere and a short-term lease was arranged at 24 Swan Street, which has been home to JLD for more than 28 years. This was the moment the school really took root and began to flourish. JLD was quickly established as a leading school specialising in ballet training, which had pupils travelling from as far as Oxford to attend classes.

Lucy and Jo's children grew up dancing with them in the studios as they negotiated the delicate balance of their roles as Principals, teachers and mothers. The school quickly became established in the Kingsclere Community and has nurtured the love of dance in thousands of students, from toddlers to adults.


In 2011 Hayley Crunden took over as Principal of JLD, a graduate of Laine Theatre Arts. Jo and Lucy stayed to teach students already on the pathway to professional ballet school, while Hayley and her team continued to offer ballet training and diversified by expanding the provision. JLD continues to provide graded dance examinations in RAD Ballet, and ISTD Tap and Modern, alongside Commercial Dance, Acro and Musical Theatre classes and LAMDA examinations, as well as numerous performance opportunities.



September in the Garden

This is the time of year to be harvesting and to observe the changing of the leaves as autumn approaches. Sadly, the days are becoming shorter, but hopefully, there will still be some late summer sunshine.



For those who grow autumn raspberries, they come into their own from the middle to the end of the month, I don't grow them myself, but I understand they have a more concentrated flavour than the earlier varieties. Cooking varieties of apples and pears will be ready at the end of the month. If you have healthy strawberry plants, now is the time to plant some of the runners, which should be pegged down into pots just to make sure that they do not have any signs of a virus. If they have, start again with new stock, planting in a fresh plot.

The vegetable garden has plenty to offer in September, main crop potatoes will be ready to be lifted, as well any onions left in the ground. Pumpkins, marrows and squashes are ready to be picked. Leave to dry in the sun for a few days. If the weather is wet put them in a greenhouse so that they can ripen and dry off before being stored. Sow winter lettuce undercover, plant autumn onion sets, and spring cabbage plants can go into the garden. Plant them six inches apart.

When the soil is moist enough plant new trees, shrubs and climbers. Perennial plants that have finished flowering and have become too large can be divided now. It is also time to take cuttings. Hardy annuals can be sown now and thinned out in the spring.

The surface of a lawn can become compacted over the summer season. To help aerate the lawn use a fork, pushing the fork into the ground at intervals over the whole area. Top dress immediately using a mixture of fine soil and sand as this will keep the holes open revitalizing the top layer. It can look a mess when you have worked it in with a stiff broom, but the grass will soon grow through.

Many of the September flowering plants have flowered early, hopefully there should still be many more to come. Agapanthus and dahlias are a couple of my favourites. Heleniums always give a good show, and if deadheaded will flower for weeks. I can't remember ever seeing so many beautiful hydrangea plants. They certainly have enjoyed the rain. As my mother-in-law used to say, they needed a gallon of water a day, and this year some days they certainly have had that.

'Threads in Sheds' is the latest special exhibition at Whitchurch Silk Mill. Opening on Saturday 11 September, it features contemporary tapestry pieces created by

members of the British Tapestry Group. Thirty-six members from across the country and even internationally have created new tapestries inspired by the heritage and traditions of weaving, showing contemporary innovative and three-dimensional techniques at their best; some on display for the first time. The exhibition will showcase the work of renowned tapestry weavers Joan Baxter and William Jefferies and silk weavers from the Mill.

Lisa Gale, Visitor Experience Manager at the Mill, says "We are incredibly privileged to premier this collection of works celebrating the art of textiles in all its brilliance. Visitors will discover ingenious techniques, colour harmony and the narratives of imagery to inspire them. As each artist has approached the topic 'Threads in Sheds' in a different way, there is something for everyone to enjoy."

Joan Baxter, one of the world's foremost tapestry artists, says "Our task, as tapestry weavers, has been to navigate through the numerous forms of yarn that silk comes in, to celebrate the wonders of its dyed colours and to try not to get immured in fine yarns that tempt us to impossibly detailed weaving."

William Jefferies, a tapestry weaver whose work is featured in many national collections, says "All sense of the industrial mills ('Sheds') has been bypassed by the individual weavers who have quietly worked through this last year of modern pandemic. It is a celebration of these weavers' vision and skill and a fitting reward to be included as part of this exhibition in such an appropriate place."

The exhibition is free with Mill admission and runs until Sunday, 21st November 2021. The Mill is open Tuesday to Sunday 10.30 am to 5.00 pm.
