

The independent Village Housing Needs Report has been published and is available on the Parish Council website. It reveals some interesting and surprising facts. Kingsclere's population is getting smaller, the average age is getting higher and families on average income cannot afford to buy entry-level houses in the village.

The survey is still live, so if you haven't completed it yet, please do so.

By the time you read this, the NP group and Parish Council will have submitted a response to the review of Basingstoke & Deane's Local Plan. The closing date for comments is 4th March.

Many policies in the Local Plan have been strengthened, particularly in light of the climate emergency and there is an emphasis on getting infrastructure in place prior to large scale builds. However, a further 14,450 new houses need to be built by 2040. This figure has been divided between settlements, Kingsclere being allocated an additional 175 new homes. In order to find sites for these homes, last year the NP group commissioned a site survey report looking at potential sites, particularly to the north of the A339. The report can be found on the Parish Council web site under Neighbourhood Planning.

The NP group will shortly commence work reviewing our NP to bring it in line with the revised Local Plan. The group would welcome additional Members, so if you are resident in the parish of Kingsclere and are interested in the future development of our beautiful village, please get in touch.

Primary Care Network is composed of two Wellbeing Advisors (Sophie and Sharon) and one peer support worker (Carissa). The Wellbeing Advisors are able to offer an assessment to help identify what is going on for you, help you set goals and collaboratively agree on the most appropriate support for you. They can offer a further 4-6 sessions for any patients over the age of 18 years, struggling with low to moderate mental health problems. This could include depression, anxiety, Obsessive Compulsive Disorder, panic attacks, stress etc. During these appointments, they will not only be able to offer tools to help understand and manage your symptoms but also signpost you on to other organisations that may be able to offer longer term support as well. Referral to the Wellbeing Advisor can be obtained via your GP or by asking at Reception.

The Peer Support Worker is able to offer support across multiple sessions for patients who have been referred by the Wellbeing Advisor. The Peer Support Worker is able to provide support in the community to help build upon the work that you will have already completed or discussed with the Wellbeing Advisor using their own lived experience of mental health problems. This may include supporting you to attend a community activity, meeting you at your home to build your confidence, or working with you in the community to reduce your anxiety.

If you would like more information on the services offered by Andover MIND, please contact Reception and ask for a referral and you will be tasked to the Team who will be in touch.

Social Prescribing

Are you lonely and isolated? We can support you in choosing activities to join or having a befriender. We can give you a warm hand and go along with you for your first time.

Are you worried about your finances? Cost of living? Right benefits in place? Housing issues? we can sign post you to the right support and advice.

Are you a Carer? We will listen to you and help you in getting the support in place. This could be talking about Power of Attorney, benefit advice, getting an emergency plan in case you are unwell, looking at carer groups for you and activities for the person you care for. We can do referrals to Adult Services for a carer's assessment or a care assessment for you if you are cared for.

We can provide you with **emotional support** after losing a loved one and get the right help you need.

We network with all our areas getting the right information for you about what activities and groups take place, so you can feel part of your community.

The Church Pages

Hello,

I was recently at a church leadership conference in Leicester, where one of the keynote speakers declared that "2024 is the year of open doors". He went on to talk about how important it

is that we close the doors from 2023 to step through the open ones in 2024 and encouraged us to think about the difficult things we'd experienced last year, and whether we can "close the door" on any of these, to leave them firmly behind us. This may well be far easier said than done, but choosing to let go of the effects of hard times – the resentment, hurt, unforgiveness, anger even – is something we do have control over.

Making a choice, for example, to leave the anger of an injustice behind us and instead to look forward with optimism and hope is a liberating thing to do. It may take a few attempts; we may find ourselves back in old thought patterns a few times before we're truly free, but if we can manage it, then we are far more able to embrace the new thing that may come our way – the open door of 2024, even.

As we head towards Easter, I've been thinking afresh on this idea of closing and opening doors.

On Good Friday we remember the flogging and crucifixion of Jesus Christ, and His death. It seems to me that if we do a good job of leaving difficult times behind us — of firmly closing the door, if you will — then the effects that an event have had on us should be as good as dead.

So, this Easter, on Good Friday specifically, I'd like to challenge you to name your "deaths" – what are the things from last year, or even from years ago, that you are consigning to the grave? How are you going to bury them, once and for all? What doors are you closing, locking, and throwing away the key to?

Then, on Easter Sunday, as we celebrate Jesus' rising to new life and the hope that brings us, certain that light has overcome darkness, I'd like to encourage you to claim your new "births".

What new life are you going to embrace? How will your hands and heart be free to give yourself fully to this new birth? What doors are you going to boldly walk through, unencumbered by baggage from your past?

Easter Sunday is a glorious day for the church, a day that points to the new life we have in and through Jesus, with all the opportunity and expectancy that comes with a new venture. My prayer for you, as you read this, is that you too can use this Easter as a springboard into a new, brighter future and that there are open doors ahead of you that will lead to life, joy and peace.



Growing seasons greetings from **Ingham's Plant Nursery.**



I am Robert Ingham and have been privileged to take on the lease of the old Cottismore Garden Centre near Headley.

My passion, and subsequent plan, is to provide an extensive range of high quality vegetable plants and seeds at reasonable prices for anyone in the who wants to grow their own food. We started sowing on 1 March 2023 and, by early May, we opened our doors to sell the first of our plants - seven varieties of tomatoes. We followed on with cucumbers, peppers, chillis, courgettes, squash, beans, beetroot, sweetcorn, cabbages and lettuce.

In this first year we have made a good start. Some of you have found us and some of you have come back several times. Some of you are beginning to enquire about the coming season and reporting on the success you have had with our plants in 2023. We have listened carefully to what you would like us to grow for your gardens and allotments. Many of you have reported that seeds failed to germinate for you in 2023, so decided to go for established small plants instead.

Starting in February we intend to plant a much wider variety (up from about 20 last year to over 80 in this coming season) and are excited to welcome you as soon as plants are ready, either for your greenhouse, or for your gardens and allotments once the threat of frost has passed.

Our first major event of the coming season will be our big Tomato Plant Sale in May (inghamsnurseries.co.uk for details). We are aiming for 13 different varieties to cater for all tastes and growing spaces including bush varieties like Tumbling Tom for your hanging baskets, sweet cherry and salad tomatoes, and bigger ones for salads and cooking.

We are also starting to contact local schools to help in any way we can with promoting the habit in our children of producing their own food. Mindful of school budgets we will be offering our complete range of plants, together with pots, compost and canes at competitive prices so that schools have all they need to get growing.

We were advised last year by allotment holders that some of them would appreciate us loading our van with a range of plants and bringing them to you on your allotments. We are certainly hoping to incorporate this into our schedule if it is something that will help. Let us know.

Unlike our first season, this year we will be able to open all week. You are welcome to visit to see what we are doing, watch the progress of the plants so you can plan what you want to grow and decide on a selection to order.



March in the Garden

We can look forward to longer days as the clocks are changed to summertime this month. Hopefully, the weather will improve after a long, wet winter. With all the rain that we have had, there are many jobs in the garden still to be done, even some of the autumn leaves remain in areas that were too wet to walk on. The worms help with some of the jobs but not all!

The spring bulbs have been giving a good show and will continue to do so as the season is extended with the different varieties of daffodils and Narcissus. When the flowers have died, try to avoid cutting the leaves as they are best left to die down naturally. Just remove the dead flowers. It does look untidy, but it is better for the bulb by providing nutrients.

Plant dahlia tubers in pots, They will need some heat if the weather becomes very cold. Cuttings can be taken from the new shoots, these will make new plants that will flower the same year. Time to divide perennials. They will grow much better if they are not choked, as the centre often dies, spoiling the look of the plant.

At the end of the month split up polyanthus—type primulas when they finish flowering. It will smarten them up and give you some extra new plants.

Sow hardy annuals towards the end of the month. Some seeds may soon be sown outdoors, this works for cornflowers, poppies, and calendulas. Some pruning may be done now, dogwoods, ornamental Rubus, and willow, to keep them under control and encourage new growth. Roses also can be pruned now.

In the vegetable garden, sow parsnips outside, and plant onion sets. The birds are very fond of pulling up the onions, so regular inspection is advisable. Early potatoes also can be planted now. Sow herb seeds outside and divide chives, these can make an attractive edging plant for beds.

Weather permitting, the grass will need cutting, making sure the mower blades are high for the first few cuts, otherwise the mower and the grass can be spoiled.

The greenhouse will probably need a tidy up and disinfecting before you start filling it with new plants.

Hoe young weeds on a warm day when the weeds are dead. Remove and mulch the borders and beds. This should retain some moisture in the soil for when the weather warms.

There are many lovely flowering plants to enjoy this month, crocus, hyacinth, forsythia, pulmonaria, epimedium, bergenia and anemone blanca.
