## **Welcome.**

The Kingsclere Allotment Management Group (AMG) would like to welcome all new plot holders.

## **News from the Plots**

The allotments look amazing at the moment, the best I have seen them since I took over my plot 10 or so years ago. It is with great regret that I recently took the decision to give up my plot due to family circumstances. I am now living vicariously by remaining as Chairperson of the AMG.

The AMG had a walk around the plots on 1 July and we noted that there are 3 or 4 plots that remain overgrown and we are working with the Parish Clerk to reallocate them or work with the tenants to ensure good levels of cultivation. The AMG will strim ASAP, the plots that are being a nuisance, not currently allocated or the tenant is in difficulty.

It was noted in our last meeting that there has been several instances of trespass and of dogs seen running loose in the allotments and one instance of fouling. Please report any instances to an AMG member or the Parish Clerk. We believe that the allotments are being used as a cut through for walkers as the pedestrian side gate had been padlocked. We are working to ensure this is reopened.

## **New Water Trough**

You may have noticed that the 3<sup>rd</sup> water trough was installed on the 1 July. If you follow the line in the grass from the water trough on Row 1, you will find it at the end of Plot 2Eb. Thank you to Adam for driving this project forward, also Rod Rosier and Jack the contractor for offering an affordable quote. This will make watering much easier for those in the top corner.

## **Polytunnels**

There has been some debate regarding the erection of polytunnels at the allotments. Opinion seems to be divided between them being a very good idea and extending the growing season to an eyesore that should be removed. Should we limit the size and number per plot or ban them altogether? We would value your opinion. Please can you send your thoughts through to the Parish Clerk as soon as possible so we can discuss them at our next meeting at the beginning of September.

There are lots of different classes to enter your flowers, plants and produce. There are also “Kingsclere resident only” classes that can be entered on the day and children’s classes. Entries fees are nominal, a Show Schedule is attached to the end of the newsletter. If you just fancy coming along to see the results, the doors open to the public at 2.30pm.

### **REMINDERS:**

**Surplus plants and produce** – If you would like to share anything, please place it next to the toilet block and it will be assumed that it is free to take.

**Orchard** - On plot 1B(b) for PLOT HOLDERS ONLY. It is important to only pick a fair amount and leave enough for everyone. This is the only area of the allotments that is free to plot holders. All other fruit trees/bushes are NOT part of the orchard and are privately owned.

**Plot maintenance** - ALL PLOTS AND SURROUNDING PATHS MUST BE KEPT IN GOOD ORDER. If you are struggling due to ill health and need help, please contact the AMG before it becomes a problem. Please carefully consider if you wish to keep your allotment and can cope with the maintenance. There are always people on the waiting list.

**1 meter path** - this must be kept clear on the left as you enter the allotments to ensure no damage is done to the fence. This applies to ALL plot holders on Row 1. Any rubbish, weeds and plants must be cleared from this area.

**Cars** – Please do not bring cars into the allotments when the ground is wet

**Toilet** – This facility is available during the Spring, Summer and Autumn. Keys, are available from the Parish Clerk with a £5 deposit.

**Bin** – You may have noticed that there is no longer a black bin at the allotments. This was taken away a few months ago by the Local Authority, as they were no longer prepared to empty it.

**Trespass and Damage/Vandalism** - If you suffer any theft or vandalism to your plot, please ring the Police on 101 and also report **all** instances to the Parish Clerk.

3. Collection of five distinct kinds of Vegetables, one of each kind
4. 4 Potatoes, white

27. 4 Dessert Apples

## SECTION C - FLOWERS

### Dahlias

32. A Collection of 3 vases, 3 blooms per vase, one cultivar per vase from three distinct classifications
33. Vase 1 bloom, Giant (Over 260mm diameter) or Large (not exceeding 260mm diameter)
34. Vase 3 blooms, Med. Cactus and/or Semi- Cactus (between 170mm and 220mm diameter)
35. Vase 3 blooms, Med. Decorative (between 170mm and 220mm diameter)
36. Vase 3 blooms, Small decorative (between 115mm and 170mm diameter)
37. Vase 3 blooms, Small Cactus and/or Semi-Cactus (between 115mm and 170mm diameter)
38. Vase 3 blooms, miniature decorative (not exceeding 115mm diameter)
39. Vase 5 blooms, Pompon (not exceeding 55mm diameter)
40. Vase 5 blooms, Small (not exceeding 170mm diameter) and/or miniature Ball (not exceeding 115mm diameter)
41. Vase 5 blooms, Water Lilly
42. Vase 3 blooms, Fimbriated
43. Vase 5 blooms, any cultivar or cultivars excluding the above

### Other Flowers

44. Vase 3 blooms Chrysanthemums, disbud, any cultivar or cultivars
45. Vase 3 stems Chrysanthemums, Sprays, any cultivar or cultivars
46. Vase 3 spikes Gladioli, Large or medium Flowered, one cultivar
47. Vase 3 spikes Gladioli, Large or medium Flowered, mixed cultivars
48. Vase 3 spikes Gladioli, Prims/Small Flowered, any cultivar or cultivars
49. Specimen Spike Gladioli
50. Collection of Cut Flowers, two distinct kinds, one vase of each
51. Vase of 1 distinct kind of flowers, not more than 5 stems (not included in this show).
52. Vase Mixed Flowers (Shrubs, grasses and seed heads may be included).
53. Vase flowers grown from seed during last 12 months
54. Vase of Roses, not more than 3 stems

61. Any other type of Pelargonium/Geranium
62. An Orchid

64. A Foliage Plant (excluding Coleus).
65. A Cactus
66. A Succulent
67. Any other Flowering plant, excluding classes 58 – 66
68. Fuchsia Cutting of Paula Jane, provided by the club

69. **Special Class:** - This class may be entered by a family, group or individual.

- A dish of Vegetables (one kind, min 2, max 5 items)
- A dish of Fruit (one kind, min 3, max 5 items)

81. A Photograph - 'Having a Rest'
82. A Photograph - 'An English Summer'
83. A Photograph - 'Vintage'

**NOTE:** - *Photographs may be coloured or monochrome, may be mounted, maximum size 5in by 7in (127mm x 178mm) excl. mounts.*

**Recipe:** - 300g unsalted butter, softened and cut in small pieces, 200g caster sugar, 4 eggs, 150g S.R wholemeal flour, 1 tsp baking powder, 150g ground almonds, 50g flaked almonds, 4 tbsp runny honey.

Preheat oven to 170 °C, gas mark 3. Lightly grease and line base of loose-bottomed tin either 23cm springform tin or 20cm square tin.

In a large bowl cream the butter, add the sugar and beat thoroughly until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time, adding a spoonful of flour each time and beating thoroughly. Combine remaining flour with baking powder and sift into bowl. Carefully fold into mixture with a large metal spoon. Stir in ground almonds and mix evenly.

Spoon mixture into the tin and spread evenly. Scatter flaked almonds over. Place tin on a baking sheet as a little butter may leak out.

Bake for 45 minutes until springy to touch and a skewer comes out clean. Trickle the honey over the hot cake to soak in. leave in the tin for about 30mins. Turn out and place on a rack to cool. Best kept a day or two before eating.

**NOTE:** - Cakes etc. must be covered by a clear polythene bag *NOT* cling film or any other bag and be at least 12 hours old. Jams and Jellies must be in clear glass jars with no commercial markings or lids and be labelled with date of making.
