As I write this the nation in is in mourning for the loss of our Queen. However, when you read these words a new reign will have begun so it is with sadness in our hearts but with hope for the future that we welcome the accession of our new King Charles III.

Kingsclere had a special relationship with our late monarch. Customers in the shops would comment if they had seen an official-looking car, sometimes with a motor-bike escort, rush past on its way up Swan Street. Surely that must have been the Queen? They were right of course. The Queen has had horses trained at Park House Stables since the early sixties and she was a regular visitor. In particular, she would make time each year whilst staying in the grounds of Highclere Castle, home of her once racing manager the Earl of Carnarvon, to visit her various horses trained in the area

According to Lady Emma Balding, Park House has trained on average 6 horses a year although presently they have 12 of her horses there. Amongst the most successful were Magna Carta, Example and Escorial and more recently, Andrew Balding trained Tactical who won at Royal Ascot in 2020.

The Queen and Park House Stables

The Royal connection with Park House Stables dates back to Oueen Victoria's son King Edward VII and John Porter the trainer. Clare Balding in her excellent autobiography tells of meeting the Queen over breakfast sausages! Andrew, her brother who has succeeded his father lan, also talks of the Oueen's horses that they are presently training in the upcoming Amazon Prime Video series Horsepower.



Lady Emma Balding who is the daughter of the previous Park House owner Peter Hastings-Bass, and wife of lan, has known the stables as long as anyone. She has kindly recalled some memories of the Oueen for us.

"Her Majesty regularly visited her horses in the Spring when she stayed at Milford Lake House and spent two days looking at her various horses in the area. She always arrived quietly with one very unobtrusive protection officer and just thoroughly enjoyed the privacy of time off. She loved talking to the various people in the yard and to the horses themselves. Her instinctive horsemanship was such that she knew which ones to keep a respectful distance from and which she could happily feed carrots to. One particular year, she asked if there was a problem with dusty straw and mentioned she had given an award to a young person who had designed a vent to capture the dust. Within weeks the tip was followed up and the next visit she made she noted the various new vents installed. Her observation of the most minor detail was very sharp and being a true country woman she was never deterred by the weather. It was an honour and privilege for all at Park House to have been able to see Her Majesty get such enormous pleasure from her horses. She took any bad news as well as any person could and was always the first to enquire after the person looking after or riding the horse if there had been an accident."

Malthouse Open Space and Gailey Brook

Temporary but useful changes have been made following the piece in the August edition of the Tower. Thanks to the work of a team lead by a local resident, the Gailey Brook now runs through the pond and out again a few yards downstream. The pond is several inches deeper than before and with running water, is much improved. This is within the scope of outline plans already agreed by the River Authority and will provide useful evidence for future planning. The nettles have been cut down as a first step towards achieving the aim of making the area better for wildlife ecology in general and people.

Thanks are due to those who have carried out the work, others who have offered help, Mark Side who has offered a generous donation in memory of his father, and the Parish Council. Councillors, as part of previous work, have planted some 2,000 bulbs. Autumn crocuses are flowering on the slope.

The Parish Council has now advised that it needs to take stock and consult before any permanent changes are made. In due course it will be probably be useful to form a small team of people prepared to work to implement plans and nurture the area in the longer term. Any new volunteers are asked to contact:

The Health Hub — Basingstoke

On S September The NHS Health Hub opened in Basingstoke. The Health Hub deliver Covid vaccinations and offer blood pressure checks, weight management and smoking cessation support. The Hub will implement other services as time goes on. It is located on the upper level of Festival Place near to the former Debenhams store. Full details of the offerings can be found here: thehealthhubbasingstoke.co.uk

Flu and Covid Vaccination programmes

The Autumn Covid Booster Vaccination programme will commence on Monday 12* September. Eligible patients will be invited to make an appointment at The Health Hub in the Festival Place shopping centre in Basingstoke. This new venue is very easy to access by public transport

Groups will be contacted by age cohort and appointments must be made through the National Booking System. This can be done online or for those who don't have Internet access, the telephone booking service can be accessed by dialling 119. GP surgeries will not send out invitations and will not be able to make vaccination appointments. Flu vaccinations will be offered at the same time for those over 65. Should patients not wish to take up the offer of flu vaccinations they will need a booking elsewhere.

Roving teams will deliver vaccinations for the housebound and for care homes.



Police Report

There has recently been an increase of burglaries in out-buildings. Please do not challenge any individuals and call 999 straight away. If you have seen any suspicious behaviour or vehicles in question, please report to us via Hampshire Constabulary website

or 101 immediately, as it will allow us to do a CCTV scope in the area to see if anyone has got recording of those vehicles or people.

Here is some advice regarding how to keep your outbuildings safe:

General home and outbuilding security:

Ensure all doors and windows are shut and locked when not in use.

Ensure windows and door frames are in good repair.

Fit good quality deadlocks conforming to the latest British Standards to all external doors.

Fit good quality window locks.

Advice is available from the Master Locksmith Association.

Security **lighting**:

Install security lights that come on automatically at dusk and go off at dawn. Help make your property look occupied by fitting timer switches to lamps in different rooms and set them to come on at staggered times.

Due to the potential fire risk in using any electrical device, it is important, that all manufacturers' instructions are strictly adhered to at all times.

CCTV and intruder alarms:

Consider installing CCTV to provide formal surveillance to the most vulnerable areas of the property.

Consider installing an audible and monitored intruder alarm system.

Get comprehensive advice from a reputable security company that conforms to national standards: NSI or SSAIB-

Entrances and exits:

Look closely at the perimeter of your land to ensure it is as secure as possible. If possible, remove all private access points that are no longer used and establish a single gated entrance and exit.

Consider installing an entry control system, infra-red, intercom or keypad entry.

Gates and hinges:

Invert and cap gate hinges so that gates cannot be lifted off. Ensure fixing bolts cannot be removed.

Use good quality padlocks with covers so they cannot be easily cut off.

Use locking posts or temporary obstructions to control large openings to yards.

Natural boundary **protection**:

Plant thorn hedges to use as natural boundaries.

Restrict vehicle access by digging deep ditches.

Nature Notes

It has been a trying time for birds this Summer with the disappearance of surface water and the necessity of making trips to find a stream that hadn't run dry: not only quenching of thirst but the lack of available insect food as the earth turned to concrete. This year there-



fore it was doubly important to ensure our birdbaths remained topped up, the one infringement of water restrictions but necessary and appreciated by birds both to drink and bathe. At any time of year bird baths are centres of attraction and bathing refreshes birds in addition to maintaining their feather condition. Amusing to watch woodpigeons bathe—they barely fit so spend much time pondering before heaving their mass into the water and there to soak in contented reflection and relief. Smaller birds have the advantage of room so can wallow and have a good soak, robins are thorough bathers, lifting each wing to trickle water into their wing pits and having a good stretch. Then come the neighbours from Hell, starlings a dozen at a time fighting, bathing, disputing, water thrown everywhere, after twenty seconds-gone and so has the water.

A ghostly grey image on the patio door is a sad reminder of a young pigeon ignorant of the properties of glass. The collision resulted in an outline of the wings and chest printed in powder down or feather dust and a body lying on the paving stones of a fully-fledged pigeon, as yet lacking the white neck markings of an adult. The impact had not only killed it but had burst open its crop revealing a mass of wheat seed. Bird silhouettes are now in place on the glass to discourage further casualties.

Walking on Newtown Common in August revealed late flowering ling heather and western gorse providing pink and yellow colour in contrast to expanses of parched grass and heathland. Shallow rooted birch trees that were in leaf, those leaves fall for lack of water, but conifers are the winners while oaks had an abundance of acorns. A challenging year for nature.



The Church Pages

Dear Friends





There have been countless reflections on the late Queen's life and reign, as well as her legacy to the country and the world at large. There has been much speculation about what will be the hallmarks of King Charles III reign. There has been much less shared about the subject of death and its reality for all humanity. The Christian Church has played a prominent role in the nation's life at this time, in keeping with Her Majesty's expressed personal faith and that is as it should be. It is in that vein that I would like to share with you a reflection on Hope and Resurrection written by this year's President of the Methodist Conference, the Rev Graham Thompson:

"Death is part of life. It seems strange to state this so starkly, but it is true. From the moment we are born, we are on a journey through life that is redolent with our mortality. We are taught what dangers to avoid; to be careful with that which can do us harm including tobacco, drugs and alcohol, and to consider the risks when driving or hill walking for instance. The NHS and the Health & Safety Executive do all they can to keep us alive but one day, we will experience death just as Queen Elizabeth II experienced it on 8th September. And so, 2022 will be remembered as the year when Queen Elizabeth died.

In the Old Testament there is a reference to the death of a king. Uzziah was a king of Judah who, like our queen, ascended the throne at a young age and reigned successfully and well for over fifty years. His death was a significant moment because so many only knew one king. For Christians, death is not the end but the beginning of a life when time is no more. We declare a 'sure and certain hope' of being raised to eternal life (1 Corinthians 15:51 f). Our hope rests in Jesus who died that we might live. Jesus invites us to die with Him that we might also rise with Him (Romans 6:5-8) and, when we make a Christian commitment, we die to self and seek to live the life of Jesus, eternally.

Our nations are mourning because our Sovereign, whom we honour and have come to admire and to love as a child of God, has died. We grieve with tears and smiles. Our tears are for our loss whilst our smiles are for happy memories and the joy of eternal hope. Our Queen believed in eternal life and we also believe and trust in Jesus who said, 'I am the resurrection and the life, those who believe in me, even though they die, will live' (John 11:25)."

So, my prayer is that we will find glimpses of hope in our everyday lives which will lift our souls towards the extraordinary, generous, unending love of God revealed in Jesus and all who bear his name.

October in the Garden

Now that at last, we have had some rain, we can get on and work in the garden. I did not write an article for September as there was so little that could be done in the garden when everywhere was so dry. There were many shrubs that needed

to be trimmed but 1 was reluctant to do so as this would have caused the plants to be stressed.

The weather starts to get cool now and days become shorter so there is no time to be wasted to get the autumns jobs done. Unfortunately many of the late flowering perennials became dried up in the summer heat. The only thing that can be done is to cut them back and hope that they will recover for next year.

I'm very tempted to plant more autumn flowering sedums as they seem to have survived the heat and are giving a late display in the flower borders. If any perennials have survived, now is the time to divide them.

Time now to pick main crop apples. These can be stored for the winter as long as they are undamaged and the fruits are not touching. The last of the potatoes should be lifted now. Remove any yellow leaves from the brussels sprouts and any other brassicas because if left on they will encourage diseases. Pick the last of the runner beans though, unfortunately, it has been a poor year for them.

There are a few things that can be planted in the vegetable garden and broad beans can be sows. 1 found it very successful last year to sow in the autumn. Spring cabbage, autumn onion sets and also garlic can be planted in October. Collect and store pumpkins and remove figs from their trees.

New hedges, shrubs and trees can be planted now making sure adequate preparation has been done to give them a good start. A compost bin that has well rotted material in it can be emptied. This would be excellent to improve the soil for the new hedges and other plantings.


Saving seeds can be a lot of fun though some seeds do not come true to the parent. Harvest on a dry day and keep in a paper bag to ready to use

Many flowers will not have lasted for the autumn this year but I'm hopeful that there could be fuchsia, chrysanthemums and a few asters plus the rowan and pyracantha berries that survive. Anything else will be a bonus after the dry hot summer
