

BDBC CONSULTATION ON CLIMATE CHANGE AND AIR QUALITY

STRATEGY – Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is now consulting on a draft of their new *Climate Change and Air Quality Strategy*. A summary of the strategy is below. Further details, including the full strategy, an accompanying Action Plan, and a **survey** to gather feedback are available at https://www.basingstoke.gov.uk/climate-consultation

Climate change remains arguably the greatest threat to the world and air quality issues threaten damage to our health. The impacts of these issues are not just confined to the other side of the world but are expected to have significant impacts locally and for our residents, particularly the most vulnerable members of our community. That is why we must all step up and take action.

And tackling these issues will bring a whole host of benefits to our borough, creating a healthier place to live and work, providing new jobs and helping tackle social issues such as fuel poverty.

In summary, the strategy sets out a framework for us to take action to tackle these issues and meet the ambitious targets set out in our **Climate Emergency declaration**, in particular:

- Becoming carbon neutral in council operations by 2025
- Working towards Basingstoke & Deane borough being carbon neutral by 2030.

The proposed strategy categorises actions into 6 main categories:

Action by all – the need for everyone in the borough to contribute

Buildings – tackling emissions from heating and powering our buildings

Transport – tackling emissions from vehicles

Zero carbon electricity – supporting the transition to a decarbonised electricity system

Waste and consumption – reducing waste and consumption Natural Environment and offsetting – maximising the climate mitigation and adaptation qualities of the natural environment

The Fieldgate Centre is run by the Kingsclere Community Association as a charity (No. 1168366). The assoiation is made up by volunteers who rely on the support and participation of the community.

People coming together in a range of social gatherings and activities is at the heart of what the Kingsclere Community Association (KCA) aims to do, so it's good to see some organised activities and small social groupings (of six or less) here, along with the organised sports teams using the fields again.

Working with other groups to put on large activities and events within the Centre is on hold at the moment, so we are keen to bring them out into the community. We hope that many of you will have taken part in our Halloween Puzzle Trail on 31st October; congratulations to those who won prizes donated by a variety of businesses. For Christmas we are organising entertainment to add to the festive spirit. Details will be in the next Tower and our website.

Despite restrictions, organised activities and businesses can (at the time of writing) still operate at the Centre. The centre is ideal for use as a base for local community support groups, or for socially distanced business meetings so give us a call. There are also a range of tasks that need to be done to keep the centre functioning. If you are looking to spend some time volunteering, which can include practical work experience, or if you have an idea about community support, please contact us.

We have been focusing on making sure the centre is in good condition for the past couple of years, and we have been fortunate in being awarded grants for capital work. A grant from Basingstoke & Deane Borough Council (B&DBC) will go towards upgrading the electrical system. Previous funding from B&DBC, Greenham Trust and Hampshire County Council will now upgrade the heating system. KCA has been managing the improvements to the sports facilities, owned and operated by B&DBC, and has recently been awarded a grant by them for the drainage of the sports pitches planned for Spring 2021. It is encouraging that B&DBC continue to support our community facilities.

A notice and invitation for the KCA's Annual General Meeting towards the end of November will be published when the date is confirmed.

Planning has now been completed to conduct a short but dignified act of remembrance on **Sunday the 8th November 2020**, which will, at the time of writing, keep us within the Government guidelines and directions regarding COVID 19.



Key points are:

- There will be no street parade this year from the old Council Office Car Park to the memorial.
- We will be unable to hold the traditional indoor church service at St Mary's. Rev Ben will be holding Sunday service following the outside Act of Remembrance.
- There will be a short but dignified service outside, at the memorial from just before 11am, similar in format to that held to mark VJ Day in August. Attendance will be strictly managed for those with an active part in the service (Standard Bearer, Vicar etc). Four wreaths will be laid as a part of the service. Any additional wreaths will be laid following the main service.
- Due to current restrictions we would discourage attendance at the memorial at 11am, this is in line with the current RBL guidance.

- Although there will be no large scale Poppy Appeal launch this year, you will see collecting tubs and goodies in the local shops and a table top sales from the 24th October, so please stop by and pick up some goodies and help out a great cause.

Kingsclere Medical Centre Retirements

It is with considerable sadness that the village has said goodbye to two of our doctors recently. Dr. Alison Steare retired in June this year after 25 years working from the Health Centre and Dr Sarah Bond retired at the end of September.

Sarah has been with the practice for 33 years joining not very long after the surgery move from the Rookery in Swan Street to the present premises. Those of us who remember the Rookery will know it bore some resemblance to the fictional Tannochbrae surgery of Dr Finlay. Friendly but distinctly out-dated.

Sarah's husband Dr David Pollard was responsible for the planning of the new surgery which made such an improvement to the medical services in the village. Sadly, David died in 2004 and it has been under the leadership of Sarah and the support of colleagues like Allison that the medical services in Kingsclere have developed.

Sarah's connection with medicine in the village has not finished entirely as her stepdaughter Dr Kirsty Pollard is one of The Watership Down Health doctors based at the Overton practice.

We wish Sarah and Alison a long and happy retirement and a very big "Thank You" for their years of service to Kingsclere.

"Lord, please may it end, please may it end, Lord..." That was my repeated prayer as I felt myself being spun around and around and around. I knew when I sat down and pulled down the restraint that it was a bad idea. But I'd impulsively jumped onto the waltzer with my two eldest daughters not really thinking until it was too late.



It began gently, falsely reassuring me, but got faster and faster, matching the pace of the music. Each time the fairground attendant span the car, it felt like we were going to fly off, and I held onto to the bar for dear life, finding it absolutely unbearable. The girls laughed and laughed, untroubled by their dad's panic and discomfort. Finally, we felt it slow and, with a deep feeling of relief on my part, it came to an end. As I left the ride, smiling weakly at the grinning fairground attendant, I vowed never to go on the waltzer ever again!

That prayer, 'Lord, please may it end, please may it end', probably will be a prayer many of us have prayed over the last six months as we've prayed about the pandemic. And I guess it's a prayer that has been prayed many times down through history as people have faced situations which they have found unbearable, perhaps in times of war or famine or oppression. As we remember those who lost their lives in war this month, horrors seen and experienced must have prompted that prayer.

In the Bible, we find that prayer answered many times as Jesus heals those with long-standing health conditions, and as He brings hope to those who felt rejected by their society. Yet at other times, we see that prayer seemingly go unanswered as Jesus' followers face hardship, pain and persecution.

But God does promise an end: "There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain" as Revelation, the Bible's final book, puts it. Believing that day is coming should enable us to live today without fear, not because Coronavirus won't touch us, though we pray it won't, but because we know that no matter what, even if it hits us hard, we will be safe eternally as we put our hope and trust in Jesus.

Faith in Him makes all the difference – live it and keep praying, "Lord, please may it end".

Kingsclere Gardening Association

The Garden Club put on a small display of fruit, flowers and vegetables in St Marys Church for the Harvest Festival on Sunday, October 4th. Les Wallace was the organiser, Denise Allen and Sylvia Pennington and myself helped with the supply and arranging of the produce on the Saturday afternoon. I brought some vegetables, Les brought his dahlias and Denise the floral material. It was good to be involved with doing something instead nothing at all as has been the case this year.

Other positive things to note, I am told Chelsea flower show will go ahead next year and our neighbouring village of Burghclere have arranged flower shows for next year and have booked our tables for the summer one. Let us hope these events can take place and a little normality resume.

With the changing season the garden changes, tender plants taken in to the greenhouse, what good colour the succulents are after a summer outside, and the black aeothiums are spectacular as well. The large holly tree is simply smothered in berries and will be scarlet at Christmas, the birds often leave these berries alone until very late or the weather gets severe - some trees are stripped well before Christmas.



The cyclamen are still flowering well, I think the rain did them good, am told we had 4 and a half inches over three days, a record I think. Cyclamen leaves begin to show now, and with many different patterns create interest without the flowers. The ongoing battle with ground elder I will never win, the michaemas daisies seemed to flower later this year but are now well in flower and most welcome. When one has perennial plants it becomes necessary to thin out and discard. Some will take over completely so a lot of Japanese anemones etc are going. I want everything to earn its place.

Kingsclere Village Club



We are delighted to announce that we have secured £34,000 of funding from Greenham Common Trust which unlocks a £34,500 grant from Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council's Local Infrastructure Fund gained earlier in March this year. The funds will together help us to improve insulation, upgrade heating systems and put in place other energy efficiency measures.

These will improve the comfort of the building in the winter for users, and be 'greener', by reducing the amount of energy we use. The project was also supported by a Kingsclere Parish Council grant of £250, and £3,000 from our own funds. Our huge thanks go to all of these organisations, as well as our local Councillors for their support. The Grade II listed building is well loved and used by many of you and adds to the special character of Kingsclere but it is always in need of practical care and repair! We have already undertaken minor structural repairs this year and will also be fixing a leaking part of the roof as soon as possible. We have been busy over the summer in the Club's lovely garden, putting in a new flower border - many thanks to all of those who have helped plant it up so far.

November in the Garden

Now is the time to tidy the garden for the winter. If you like to cut back the herbaceous borders, since most plants have finished flowering, it can be done now, weather permitting, as the days can be frosty with cold winds.

When there is a dry day without the wind, rake up the remaining leaves. Try to keep off lawns when wet, use a plank to stand on if needed, and avoid treading on frosted lawns otherwise the result will be burns that damage the grass.

With so little work to do in the garden, cleaning and maintaining our tools is good idea, particularly as we now have a business in the village that will sharpen our tools. It's so nice to take out sharpened tools to start work on the garden in the Spring.

Bare rooted roses can be planted, as can deciduous trees and shrubs; weather permitting, these can be planted from now until March. Plant tulips in the garden or pots before the end of the month. If you grow in smaller pots they can be sunk into the garden in the spring if you find you have a spot that is lacking in colour.

Tie in any climbers to secure them from further winds through the winter, and also remember to check any tree ties and stakes.

Large pots with suitable plants that cannot be moved easily may be insulated with hessian sacking and bubble wrap.

Carry on digging in the vegetable garden, lift parsnips, harvest Brussel spouts, and protect cauliflower heads by bending over inner leaves to prevent the curds from going yellow. Remember to net any brassicas that will over winter, as they will become welcome food for the birds.

Pruning established apple and pear trees can begin now. Any branches that cross or rub against one another should be cut away completely, keeping the centre of the tree open. Other leader branches should be cut back by one third.

There are a few colourful plants and shrubs still in the garden, including winter flowering honeysuckle, small flowers with a wonderful scent, the smoke bush with deep red leaves, many interesting grasses, and Pyracantha, with lovely orange berries. If you are fond of foliage plants, I recommend Arum Italicum Pictum. It makes an appearance at this time of year, stays all winter then dies back for the Summer, and its leaves are good for cutting to use in the house .



A few autumn/firework activity ideas for your under 5's:

- Firework painting take a drinking straw and cut slits about 5cm long, so that you can spread the sections out (to look a bit like a chimney sweep brush). Dip this in paint and print your fireworks onto paper.
- Make your own sparkler cut up strips of shiny and coloured paper and attach to the end of a stick
- Toilet roll rockets, add a cone to the end of a toilet roll and some fire out of the bottom using tissue paper
- Make a leaf crown go collecting leaves and stick to a paper crown
- Fir cone hedgehogs collect some fir cones and add googly eyes and faces to make friendly hedgehogs

Nature Notes

We were watching three well grown cygnets on the lakes by the river Anton when they suddenly clattered into flight and flew for over 100m: Not elegant flight, with feet still trailing in the water for much of the way but the power of their wings was evident. They then paddled back to the start, swam a little then off they went again. It was such an impressive display that we sat in the September sun and enjoyed five performances until they turned their attention to feeding. A little further along the path was the rather flattened nest on which the parent birds were leisurely stretched but not for long, as the young aviators arrived to spoil their tranquillity.

Wasps were still very active and were to-ing and fro-ing in a well rotted alder stump down at water level, the nest being tucked within and out of sight. In most Summers groups of tiny mining bees, of which there are several species, can be seen energetically digging into light soil along lawn and border edges. Eggs are laid in the burrows, supplied with pollen, sealed and left to hatch. This year hundreds of lawn bees as they are described could be seen flying low over whole lawn areas. The soil beneath was known to be sandy and this was evident in the tiny piles of evacuated material brought to the surface. This activity lasted for several weeks and now only small patches of sand remain. The sheer numbers of bees had been exceptional.

There was concern about the sudden absence of red kites locally especially as four were found dead recently. Certainly we noticed that buzzards had the sky to themselves for nearly a month. Happily these beautiful birds are back in full strength again.
