FESTIVE BIN COLLECTIONS - Christmas can mean extra rubbish. Therefore, for the first collection after Christmas ONLY, Basingstoke and Deane will collect extra rubbish sacks left by your grey bin.

It is also an opportunity to recycle as much as you possibly can. B & D will collect extra recycling as long as it is inside a clear bin liner. In dry weather you can leave extra cardboard next to your recycling bin. Please ensure it is flattened and no bigger than lm x lm. Wrapping paper cannot be recycled, so please put it in your grey waste bin.

Unless adverse weather affects bin rounds, collections should return to normal from Monday 2 January 2023.

There will be a two-week break for garden waste collections over the festive period. Collections will stop after Friday 23 December and will resume on Monday 9 January 2023.

CHRISTMAS TREES - Garden waste customers can leave real Christmas trees out for collection next to their garden waste containers. Trees over 6 ft should be cut in half and all decorations should be removed.

CHRISTMAS CARDS - Cards without glitter and ribbons may be recycled. **GREEN WHEELY BINS & GLASS RECYCLING** - the collections dates are Wednesday 14th and 2th December 2022. then 11th and 25th January 2023. **MAKING A DIFFERENCE AWARDS 2023** - Plans are underway to present the awards in June 2023. We will be asking you to help us recognise those residents who deserve a big public thank you for their commitment. Further details and the application fonn will be available in the New Year.

STARTING SCHOOL IN SEPTEMBER 2023 - If your child is 4 or will turn 4 before I September 2023, they can start school in September 2023. There are other options for parents of four-year-olds who feel their child is not yet ready for school. For more information go to www.hants.gov.uk/admissions where you will also find information about schools in Hampshire. Alternatively, parents can phone 0300 555 1377 or <u>admissions.team@hants.gov.uk</u> for further support. The application deadline for starting Year Rat primary school in 2023 is the 15th January 2023.

Kingsclere Neighbourhood Plan



Some members of the NP group recently met with the agents and owners of the Coppice Road and Strokins Road sites for an update. These are two of the three sites approved for development in our

Neighbourhood Plan. After discussions with the Local Planning Authority, the owners have agreed to develop the sites separately. Vivid will develop the Strokins Road site providing I 00% affordable housing whilst Bewley Homes will develop the Coppice Road site which will include 40% affordable homes.

It is intended that planning applications will be submitted later next year, but beforehand, the developers will be in consultation with the Parish Council and local residents. The Neighbourhood Plan provides for at least 14 dwellings at Strokins Road and at least 26 dwellings at Coppice Road. Please keep checking the Parish Council website and Facebook for further information.



Adult Flu and Covid vaccination programmes Good progress is being made on both the Covid

Vaccination Autumn programme 2022 and the Flu

programme. Our thanks go to our Team and our PPG volunteers who have come to support the clinics. If you have not had your Flu vaccination and are over? 0 or have been invited (underlying health reason), please book an appointment.

Child Flu Clinics

We are still working through contacting the parents of eligible children who are. aged 2 - 3 years or aged 4 - 17 with an underlying health condition which puts them at greater risk. Children in years R-7 will be vaccinated in school by the School Health Service.

Blood Taking

We offer around 600 - 700 blood-taking appointments per month at our surgeries through our phlebotomists and health care assistants. This is still sometimes not enough, so if you can drive, there are other options such as attending one of the hospitals.

Defibrillator at the Fieldgate Centre

Kingsclere Youth Football Club is leading an initiative to install a defibrillalor at the Fieldgate Centre that will be available all day every day for anyone m need at the centre or in the locality. While there is a defibrillator at the other end ofKingsclere by the fire station, the club believes that there should be one by the major sporting and social centre because, if needed, speed of access is essential. If used within 3 minutes of a sudden cardiac arrest a patient's survival chances are increased by 80%

The Tower magazine has generously agreed to give a substantial grant towards the cost, while another grant has been agreed by a charity that will provi e the defibrillator and cabinet, and an additional application has been subm tte to Four Lanes Trust. The club itself will be making a large contn_bution towards the cost but would be grateful for any additional donations o what will be a village facility. Busy Bees Pre-school (Kingsclere)

Many of you by now may be aware of the current situation at Busy Bees. We have been operating in Kingsclere for forty-six years and have provided good quality childcare (Ofsted's words) to the children in the village and the surrounding area. However, like many businesses, this came at a cost and the spiralling costs of PPE to keep children and staff safe, and the expense of other resources, has depleted our reserves. This period was then followed by two years of a low child birth rate throughout North Hampshire which has affected the number of children in attendance. Hampshire County Council Education Department have advised this 'hopefully' should be a temporary situation but, in the meantime, it has left Busy Bees in a very precarious financial position.

Many of you have very kindly already made financial donations for which we are extremely grateful and we thank you for your support. Our **Gofundme.com** page is still active, and we ask anyone who can help us to

Sadly, without further support, there is a very real possibility that Busy Bees could close and this would have a devastating impact on the pre-school children in Kingsclere. Nature Notes

In previous notes, we have commented on an extremely tall grass crop that was cropped annually and has regrown. A recent farming programme featured this plant as Miscanthus. It can occupy poor soils, reaches 6-8 feet annually, is cut and baled for biofuel and has a crop life of twenty years. An added advantage is its potential to provide cover for wildlife. A pair of plump muntjac could be seen in the paddock behind Fawconer Road on a sunny afternoon enjoying the



bounty of acorns scattered in the herbage. The buck was a dusky brown while the doe was a brighter tan. The lure of acorns had tempted them out in broad daylight, and they seemed to be unconcerned by the thunder of heavy traffic on the A339 a few metres away.

Summer has been reluctant to give way to autumn. A hummingbird hawkmoth visited the garden on 11th October and bumble bees have taken advantage of the abundance of flowers surviving in a frost-free month.

The Lake, again on a sunny mid-September day, and peering down into clear bankside water, a sudden movement across the leaf bottom, then another following on; unmistakable, Crayfish! They were White Footed crayfish, native to this country and unique and having a bad time due to the introduction of the American Signal Crayfish for the restaurant trade. These are larger, aggressive and physically destructive of our own but also deadly in the spread of crayfish plague to which they themselves are immune, think of grey versus red squirrels. All is not lost! Great efforts have been made to trap the aliens and a widespread programme of breeding and reintroduction of whites has and is taking place. Crayfish have shells so distribution follows chalk and lime streams and clean water lakes where they can absorb the necessary calcium. A real thrill to have seen these.

The Church Pages

Dear Friends



This edition of The Tower will reach you shortly after Advent Sunday - the beginning of a new Church Year. The four weeks of Advent are a vital part of the preparation period before we celebrate again the coming of God into the world in human form as the infant Jesus. A celebration that will continue through the month of January up to the feast of Candlemas, which was the day that all the Church's candles for the year were blessed. The candles that will be lit at the beginning of the service each week during Advent have a significance which adds to the totality of the story, reminding us of the main characters of the unfolding Christmas story.

Increasingly, we see references to 'Xmas' rather than 'Christmas' "When people use Xmas, they really mean Xhaustion, Xcuses, Xchanges, Xcesses, Xtravagances, Xasperations, Xhibitions, and worldly Xcitement."

By leaving 'Christ' in Christmas, we have a different focus for our festivities. John the Baptist, Jesus's cousin spoke of a road being prepared in the wilderness, of mountains being flattened, of valleys being raised up and of crooked roads being made straight. What significance does the season of Christmas hold for us? Ts it more than a time to "eat, drink and be merry?" Are we prepared internally to remember the birth of the Messiah into our world and the challenge to the status quo that this brought?

The road to be taken by Jesus in his public ministry was set out in the song that Mary sang following that encounter - the Magnificat. It is a song that speaks of turning the world right way up, of bringing in a kingdom where the watchwords are justice and peace. It is a song that makes demands of us and all people of faith. The message of the song was revolutionary and it was echoed by the song of the angels. For once you accept that God is Love, that God cares about the well-being of every human on the planet, that Christ died for all people not just the ones we like or who do things "our way", it becomes impossible to justify the oppression of one people by another; it becomes impossible to justify that some would live in absolute luxury while others go to bed each night worrying about food and heat, sanitation and freedom. Jesus came to turn the world right way up.

How will our preparations and celebrations reflect that truth to those with whom we share the season? What will differentiate 'Christmas' from 'Xmas' for us?

I wish you a peaceful Christmas and a hopeful New Year,

December in the Garden

As I write this article, we still have had very little frost which has resulted in an amazing Autumn display from the trees. This has extended the period of raking up the leaves. Also with the amount of rain that has fallen. many of the gardening jobs have been delayed.



Apart from removing the fallen leaves, there are several jobs that can be done on fine days. Prune overgrown deciduous hedges, such as beech and hornbeam. If left they become unmanageable and need drastic work to contain them. They are dormant now, so this is a good time to get the job done. If not already done there is still time to cut back tall growing rosebushes

Ornamental vines can grow 10 feet in one season so these can be pruned now. Thin out overcrowded shoots and prune side shoots to two buds from the main stem. Prune blackcurrants. The plants will produce fruit on old and new growth, pmne so that there is a balance of new and old wood.

Brassicas will need attention, particularly if it becomes windy. It's easier to give them a stake when planted as we have trees that draw the plants up which makes them a bit taller and more vulnerable to the elements. Continue removing any vellowing leaves as these will encourage fungal diseases.

Weather permitting, soil conditions can be improved by digging in wellrotted manure or compost. Sheds and fencing could do with some winter protection, making sure that the product used is not harmful to plants.

The flower borders can still be cut back. With the recent rain, many plants have been spoiled, so if we were to have frosts, they are past looking good which is a pity as some plants can look stunning.

Hippeastrum bulbs are popular as Christmas presents. Pot up now, making sure that the bulb is not planted too deeply. With a little care, the bulbs will flower again next year.

There are a few flowering plants that appear at this time of year. Winter jasmine with yellow flowers has a rather scrambling habit, verbomm, has small clusters of pink highly scented flowers and mahonia which has vellow scented flowers.

Some of the evergreen shrubs give colour in the winter with their variegated leaves, a good shrub is the elaeagnus which has bright yellow margins on the leaves. All of these plants are a very welcome sight in winter.

'Dear Editor

On Tuesday 25th October, I had a very frightening experience which I would like to share with your readers,

T am a lady in her seventies and Town two medium sized rescue dogs who love people but are very reactive to other dogs. For this reason, they are always walked on (long) leads and I always walk them somewhere where I can see a long way ahead and therefore take appropriate avoiding action if I see other dogs coming towards me.

The perfect walk for me is therefore what I call "The Gallops" (not sure of its real name), which is the footpath on the left-hand side just outside the village on the Sydmonton Road. It is a popular spot for dog walkers and ramblers alike.

On Tuesday, 1 was walking as usual about 11am. 1 had done my outward leg and was on my return journey down the straight stretch back towards my car which was parked in the layby at the start of the public footpath.

I was then confronted by the sight of a pack of hounds with the huntsmen and about 35/40 hunt followers on horseback coming towards me at speed. Those who know the area will know that it is not a very wide strip of ground and it is flanked on one side by a line of jumps, which many of the followers were jumping and on the other by a spinney. As the oncoming hunt were taking up the whole area, 1 tried to take refuge in the spinney as fast as 1 could. This was difficult as I do not move as fast as I used to and the whole area is covered in brambles which makes walking through them extremely difficult.

There was no respite once I was in the spinney as some of the hunt followers were riding up the other side of the spinney and quite a few of the hounds had left the main pack and were coming in and out of the wood and coming up to my dogs, who were whirling around on the end of their leads. The only thing I could do was hang on for dear life and try not to fall over, as due to my arthritis, if I fall, I am unable to get up unaided.

As far as I am aware there was no advance notice that the hunt would be coming down that public footpath, that day. There was certainly no warning on the fence at the start of the footpath, had there been, I would of course, have walked my dogs elsewhere.

My dogs and l were luckily unscathed by our experience, but l have to say l found it absolutely terrifying. This public footpath is in frequent use and in my opinion, this could have resulted in a serious accident. I strongly feel that we should have had advance notice of what was happening on that day so that we had the opportunity not to put ourselves in harm's way.
