#### Norovirus

Please be aware that we have been seeing a lot of cases of Norovirus, also known as the 'winter vomiting bug'. It is the most common stomach bug in the UK. It can spread easily through close contact, or by contaminated surfaces, food or water. The main symptoms are a sudden onset of nausea, followed by vomiting and diarrhoea. Other common symptoms include a high fever, headache and aching arms and legs.

Good hand hygiene is important to stop norovirus spreading, you should:

- wash your hands thoroughly using soap and warm water after using the toilet or contact with a sick individual and before preparing and eating food.
- stay off school or work until you have not been sick or had diarrhoea for at least 2 days.
- not rely on alcohol gels instead of washing your hands, as these do not kill the virus.
- wash any contaminated clothing or bedding using detergent at 60°C using disposable gloves to handle any items.
- use bleach-based cleaners to disinfect surfaces.

If you catch norovirus, stay home for 48 hours after your symptoms clear.

We have an important Training Afternoon on **Wednesday 28<sup>th</sup> February 12.30 – 18.30pm.** North Hampshire Urgent Care (NHS 111) will be covering all Urgent calls between these hours that cannot wait until the next day. We will be open again on Thursday 29<sup>th</sup> February 2024 at 8.00am.



#### **New Hospital Consultation**

The consultation process on the new hospital has now started; it runs until midnight 17<sup>th</sup> March 2024. The main purpose of the consultation will be your input into the three options being proposed. There are two potential sites, the existing site of the North Hants hospital or a new grass roots site near Junction 7 of the M3. Option 1 is to build on the existing site, options 2 and 3 build on the new site but with different levels of use for the existing hospitals at Basingstoke and Winchester. The management and medical teams state their preference as Option 2 - a new Acute Hospital near to Junction 7 of the M3, with the existing hospitals at Winchester and Basingstoke being mainly used for outpatients, diagnostics and therapies and planned day-case surgery.

## **The Church Pages**

#### Dear Friends

This month we will see the beginning of Lent. The emphasis for many people seems to be on doing without things: there is still a tradition for people to "give things up" for Lent. This all seems to lead to a very negative emphasis on the whole season. Christians are called to

lead to a very negative emphasis on the whole season. Christians are called to respond to the season of Lent in a far deeper way. It is the beginning of what can be a hugely positive spiritual experience, culminating in the glory and triumph of the Resurrection.

The prophet Joel is prophesying that the day of the Lord is coming and the people actually have to do something about getting themselves ready for it. (Joel 2:1-2 and 12-17). He says that there is more to true repentance than an outward show of different behaviour. He tells them "rend your hearts and not your clothing". In part of the account of the Sermon on the Mount, Matthew takes this idea on further and says that the disciplines of alms giving, prayer and fasting are matters between the individual and God, to be done in secret. They are signs of repentance and a re-aligning of oneself spiritually. If they are carried out ostentatiously in public they become statements of power, of actions that seek some reward or acknowledgement and thus run contrary to the nature of the servant ministry to which we are called.

Lent offers us an annual opportunity to take stock of our spiritual lives and the directions they are going. It has traditionally been a time of selfexamination and withdrawal from the things of the world. Hence the concept of "giving things up". It is a period of readjustment, of repentance, of getting back on track to live the lives God calls us to. But the Christian life is not one to be lived in isolation from the world. We need to reflect not only on our particular journey, but also on how that interacts with the communities in which we live out our faith. A former President of the Methodist Conference, Chris Hughes Smith wrote the following: "*Repentance is the offering of sacrifice, not as aimless 'giving up' of things for spiritual self-gratification, but as sharpening spiritual awareness, and wholeheartedly offering to God new patterns of act and attitude, with the longing that these will have effect in a particular direction, according to his will.*"

May our celebration of Lent not be a time of downcast eyes and heavy hearts about what we are missing out on, but a time of re-focussing with our eyes on God that we might better discern his will.



By mid-month, the relentless New Year rain that saturated the ground has finally given way to brighter, colder days. The dazzling blue skies allow us to be out and about more freely but only if we are well wrapped up. Dorothy Parker evokes it vividly in her revenge poem, 'Braggart' -

Like January weather, The years will bite and smart, And pull your bones together To wrap your chattering heart.

The earth's gradual tipping away from the sun has provided my daughter and I with a new interest on our walks - looking for pools of sunlight to 'catch' and wave to our long shadows. 'Shadow so tall!' she cries with wonder.

We saw few birds when the river was swollen and chalky white with rainwater. Now, calm and crystal-clear again, we have spotted two moorhens skulking in the shallows near the willow tree. We see them frequently and I wonder if they are building a nest in the secretive bend of the river. They scatter as we approach (we're not the quietest of walkers), spirited away on those wonderful yellow,



stalky legs. They are happily evolved to cope with the freezing water by a clever counter-current heat exchange system: warm blood flows down from their bodies and, as it reaches the feet, cools to acclimatise to the temperature of the water. This prevents frostbite. The blood is then warmed again as it circulates back up to the body, so as not to chill their little chattering hearts.

In the same area we often see a ghostly little egret, looking for fish. Feeding the ducks by the lake one day, I looked up into a large leafless tree and was amazed to spot *five* of these quiet little herons spread among the branches like huge, white, feathered fruit.

The red berries of this season brighten up the garden beautifully and we love watching the blackbirds gulp the fruits of the cotoneaster tree in our garden. One breakfast time we counted a particularly hungry male guzzling nine berries in one sitting as we ate our Weetabix.

#### FEBRUARY IN THE GARDEN

How lovely to start to have longer days, the dark and wet winter has been very long. Very little has been done in the garden this winter, as working on wet soil and grass does more damage than good. Hopefully we will be able to cut back perennials and ornamental grasses that are left from the winter, being careful not to cut any new shoots that may be emerging. If weather permits do try taking some root cuttings from the perennials while you are cutting them back, even if you do not require them yourself someone else will like them I'm sure. Other plants to be trimmed back now are winter flowering heathers, and late flowering clematis. If clematises are left unpruned they become a tangled mess and only flower high up in the plant.

Prune deciduous hedges now, such as beach and hornbeam; this needs to be done while they are dormant and before the birds start nesting. If you grow wisteria, prune now to encourage more flowers. This needs to be done with care; the object is to achieve a framework of well spaced vigorous branches. If flowering has been poor feed with Growmore or fish, blood and bone.

Dig over the vegetable patch and add compost. The compost needs to be at least a year old and well rotted. The soil should be limed if brassicas are to be grown as they prefer alkaline soil. The soil in the vegetable patch can be warmed up by covering with black plastic for when you start planting.

Lettuce, carrots, chard and radish can be sown under cover or on a windowsill. Plant onions and shallot sets outside, checking them regularly to make sure the birds have not pulled them out of the ground. Early potatoes can also be chitted, placing them in an egg box indoors where they will produce shoots. Only 3-4 shoots will be required on each potato; rub any excess shoots off.

In the flower garden the snowdrops are a welcome site; they are easily divided after flowering. If the winter baskets and tubs are looking sad, refresh with primroses and violas. Plant sweet peas now; they can be placed in pots in the greenhouse or they can be started on a damp kitchen towel left in a warm place, getting them to shoot before planting in pots. Start dahlia tubers; plant in soil and spray every now and then, this must be done where they will be frost free. The new shoots make good cuttings that will flower the same year.

Plants that are at their best this month: hellebores, winter heathers, hardy cyclamen, dwarf iris, early narcissi and crocus, viburnum tinus and camellia.



## Sandham Memorial Chapel, the 'Holy Box' of Burghclere

Sandham Memorial Chapel is nestled in the northwestern corner of Burghclere. The Chapel, or Holy Box, as Stanley Spencer the artist called it, houses Spencer's visionary paintings. It was built to honour the forgotten dead of the Great War. Spencer was commissioned by Mary and Louis Behrend.

The architect Lionel Pearson, who had designed the Royal Artillery Memorial at Hyde Park, was commissioned in 1924 to create the Holy Box, working from Spencer's sketches. We know from Spencer's correspondence that he wanted it plain outside just like a box with no ornament or features. The Behrends insisted on the alms houses which would serve a philanthropic purpose and but also to accommodate a chapel warden. The resulting complex is eclectic and austere and allows the focus to fall solely on the artwork inside. The orchard and meadow were planted in the 1920s. In 2014 The Garden of Reflection was created to mark the centenary of the First World War.

We reopen on 7<sup>th</sup> March 2024, Thursdays - Sundays, 11am – 3pm.
