**ALLOTMENT RENEWALS** – All agreements and rents are due to the office by March 1<sup>st</sup>. KPC has a couple of vacant plots which will hopefully be allocated by the time this edition goes to print.

**TREE WORKS**– During February KPC instructed a company to fell 6 dead Elm trees from the William Holding Field in the interest of safety. Also, the trees around the perimeter of the old Cemetery are being Crown lifted to enable safe passage for visitors and our grounds maintenance team.

The Parish Council plans to plant 10 native holly trees in the William Holding Field in the hedgerows before the Spring. During the winter we planted a further 5 trees in the Community Orchard as part of the Jubilee Green Canopy. There are also plans to plant a further 30 trees via grant from the Woodland Trust in various locations during the Autumn/Winter 2022/23.

**CEMETERY MEMORIAL SAFETY CHECKS**– A safety inspection has now been completed and KPC is currently in the process of trying to trace relatives of those memorials which failed. It was unfortunate that three memorials had to be lain down during the inspection, others have been issued a repair recommendation and only if KPC fails to trace relatives will these memorials then be laid down. KPC is required to comply with Health and Safety rules and for insurance purposes, to carry out these inspections which do come as a cost to the village.

### As of 29th January 2022, The Highway Code has changed.

These advisory changes have been implemented to improve safety for people walking, cycling and horse riding.

Every road user still has a responsibility to keep themselves and each other safe, and the changes mean being ready to give priority, leave space and be considerate of others.

In summary, irrespective of your method of transport, a new hierarchy of road users has been introduced to ensure those who can do the greatest harm have the greatest responsibility to reduce the danger or threat they may pose to others. This means:

- Giving priority to people crossing or waiting to cross and people cycling straight ahead when turning in and out of junctions
- Giving plenty of space when passing cyclists and horse riders
- Making sure we act with responsibility and respect to all road users

#### Specifically:

- **give priority to pedestrians** crossing and waiting to cross and **cyclists** going straight ahead when turning in and out of junctions.
- **leave at least 1.5 metres when overtaking** cyclists at speeds of up to 30mph, and give them more space when overtaking at higher speeds.
- **pass horse riders and horse-drawn vehicles at speed under 10 mph** and allow at least 2 metres of space.
- allow at least 2 metres of space and keep to a low speed when passing a pedestrian walking in the road.
- **open car doors with the hand furthest from the door** to help car users look over their shoulder to see cyclists or pedestrians nearby.
- cyclists may cycle in the centre of the lane or two abreast for their own safety, whilst allowing others to overtake when it is safe for them to do so.

My friend is dying. He is in his late thirties and has a wife and three children under 10. Many have prayed for healing over the last few months, for hospital appointments to go well and scans to be clear, but healing doesn't appear to be coming. This is really tough and we may ask ourselves why and where is God in this. And yet as Christians, even when surrounded by pain and suffering, we choose to believe that God has an everlasting love for us, that He works everything out for the good of those who love Him. And we choose to believe those things, because they are promises God makes us in the Bible and because of His work in our hearts, helping us to experience His love and goodness. For my friend, I pray he will continue to remember and trust these things even in his final days, remembering the glorious hope he has, life forever with a God who loves us with a love unimaginable.

Last month, I wrote about making faith a priority and not putting off the big questions. My friend's situation reminds me that we have limited time in this life. So please don't dismiss faith questions but take time to consider them properly and if you'd like anyone to talk to, then please do get in contact.

As I also mentioned last month, we will be moving from our home in a few weeks' time, and this is partly prompted by our conviction that we must make the Lord, our faith if you like, a priority. We've taken this decision having prayed and thought through what we believe the Lord is calling us to. We want to take the opportunity to invest in deepening our relationship with Him and learning what it means to serve Him in a different context, perhaps, we think, overseas where people haven't had the opportunity to hear about Him. We'll be moving to do some training for 5 months with an organisation called Youth with a Mission at their base The King's Lodge in Leicestershire. During that time, we'll be praying that the Lord would make clear the next step. We'll also go on praying for our friend. We believe we are being called to 'Go', but we will miss many in these villages and are so grateful for the support we've received over the years.

# **Read Easy**

There has been a great deal of publicity about adults who struggle to read as a result of Repair Shop presenter, Jay Blades, taking part in a recent BBC documentary. This follows his journey as he faces up to the challenge of learning to read as an adult with his local branch of Read Easy, and in particular, his patient and encouraging Volunteer Coach, Emma.

In the Basingstoke & Deane Council area, we have been helping adults with their reading skills for the past two and a half years, and we have seen at first-hand what a difference that learning to read makes. We have had a number of our Readers now graduate from the Read Easy programme. Paul from Tadley, only learnt to read in his 40s and is now encouraging others who may be struggling, to ask for help. He wanted to make his wife and daughter proud, and he has certainly achieved that. Joelma, is so pleased to be able to help her children with their homework, and a third Reader says that learning to read "is the best thing that's ever happened to me". We are very proud of all of our Readers.

We have trained Volunteer Coaches ready and waiting to help, providing free one-to-one reading coaching for adults who are unable to read or who find it difficult. ## 18 March In The Garden

March may bring bitter cold winds, it also is the month when the garden begins to come to life. Many spring bulbs are giving a lovely show, but there is always the chance of some snow.

Now is the time to mulch, this will help to keep the moisture in the soil as the warmer weather soon dries it out. Compost is the best option if you are fortunate to have the space to make your own. If using farmyard manure make sure it is well rotted, otherwise you can introduce unwanted weeds into the garden. If a good layer of mulch is applied this should hopefully help to suppress weeds.

At this time of year the grass needs to be cut regularly to keep it in good condition. The first few cuts will need the mower blades set high.

This really is the last opportunity to plant bare-rooted plants. Of course pot grown plants can be planted through to the autumn, as long as they are well watered in.

Prune roses now, taking out any stems that crossover, the aim is to open up the plant so that it is cup shape. Most people worry that over pruning will kill the plant, but roses are tough. The shrubs to prune now are Dogwood, Eucalyptus and Willow.

Perennials that have become large can be divided; if left the centre of the plants often die. Once divided and replanted water and feed to encourage new growth. Primulas that have flowered can be divided now; this will make the plants tidier and also increase your stock. Climbing plants will need supporting plus any tall growing perennials. Plants look more natural growing through the supports rather than tying in later.

Sow hardy annuals; these can be grown outside now. Many vegetable seeds can be sown now, including broad beans, parsnips, early potatoes, onion sets and herbs. Make sure that the soil is well prepared.

There are lots of lovely plants flowering now. If you have the space for them to spread Scilla Siberica Spring Beauty is worth growing. Other star plants are the flowering cherry tree, crocuses, and narcissus "Cheerfulness". How lucky we are to have such varieties in our gardens.

There has been concern for some time about the decline in the numbers of eels in our waters. The time was when one could peer into the Test and see good sized eels swimming happily with the trout and in similar numbers, but you would be very lucky to see the same sight now. Interesting fish and surrounded by folklore and yes, they can survive and travel overland between waters, under the right conditions. Many years ago, I was a keen angler and on very rare occasions would hook an eel. Things to quickly learn about them-they are very lively, they are very strong, and they are very SLIPPERY. Experienced anglers who regularly encountered them would often include a newspaper in their tackle on which to drop the fish to limit its writhing whilst being unhooked. The decline is not limited to UK but Europe-wide and it would be sad if a fish that is the Epitome of sleek beauty and had been a mainstay of people over centuries should just fade away. They are now listed as Critically Endangered.



Moles! The bane of lawn lovers and vegetable growers. Our attention was drawn to an immense molehill accompanied by a chain of more modest ones in a friend's garden. 30cm high and approximately 75cm across it was hard to believe that a creature only14cm long and weighing only 110gm could create such a mound-an average molehill weighs approximately 1kg of soil. These extra large heaps are thought to be the result of extra activity but are also cover for the football sized nest chamber, lined with grass and leaves, where the young are born in late Spring. Researching mole lifestyle can only arouse respect for these unique little creatures, nuisance though can be. What we could not find was any gender specific word for male, female or young. Any ideas?
